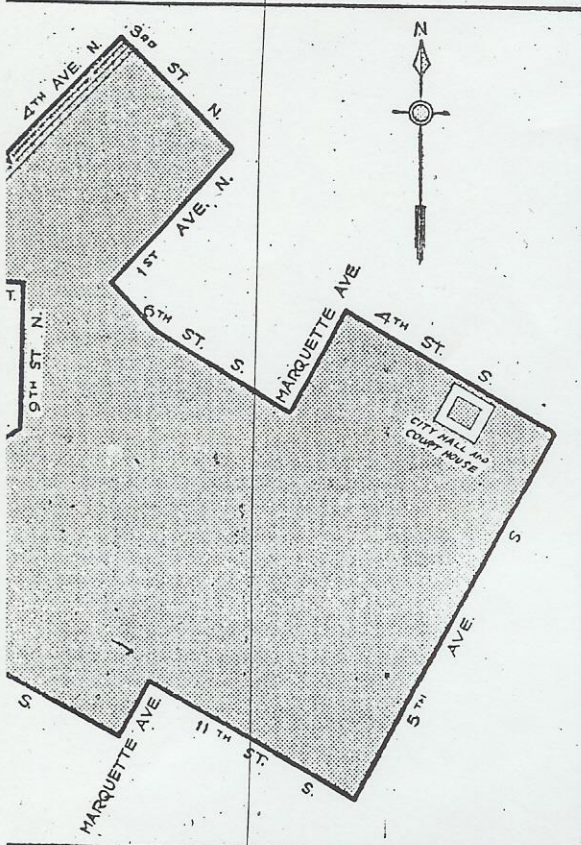

State Reception to Honor O. H. Case; GAR Veteran, 92

Notables to Pay Tribute to Department Commander Friday

Omar H. Case, 92-year-old department commander of the Grand Army of the Republic, will be honored at a statewide reception in Memorial hall at the Courthouse at 2 p.m. Friday. The reception is being sponsored by the Appomattox post No. 72, GAR, and auxiliary.

Invitations have been extended to comrades of Mr. Case, members of the Woman's Relief Corps, members of allied orders and friends. More than 500 persons are expected to attend.

Mr. Case was appointed adjutant general of the Minnesota Soldiers Home in 1932, serving until his election to commander of the department of Minnesota in June, 1933. He is also commander of Appomattox post No. 72 and its auxiliary.

Mr. Case came to Minnesota from Pittsfield, Mass., in 1860. He enlisted in the Minnesota Infantry division in 1862 and served in the Indian outbreak in 1862-3, afterwards taking part in the Sibley expedition across western Minnesota and the Dakotas.

He engaged in many battles and skirmishes in the Civil war the most important of which were at Tupelo and Oxford, Miss., Nashville, Tenn., and Mobile and Spanish Fort, Ala. He also participated in the pursuit of Confederate General Price and his army across Arkansas and Missouri.

Following the war, Mr. Case returned to Minnesota, where he resumed his profession of surveying and civil engineering. He married Miss Elma Hicks in 1873.

Speakers on the reception program include Mrs. Edna Elmquist, president of the Appomattox Women's Relief Corps, who will deliver the address of welcome, and Rev. Charles Fox Davis, Entertainment will be by Mrs. Grace Davis Le Clair, soloist, accompanied by Mrs. Sara Hyre; Miss Anne Allee, reading, and the Gerald Dibble orchestra.
